At our final term assembly, the Year 11 Drama students portrayed a prayerful reflection of the Stations of the Cross. Reflecting on the Stations of the Cross is a powerful form of prayer that allows us to contemplate Holy Week, the most important time in the Church year that leads to the joyous celebration of Easter.

The Stations of the Cross have great significance and can help us to navigate our spiritual journey and deepen our faith. The Stations of the Cross help us connect with Jesus. In Week 8 we celebrated the Blessing and Opening of the newly refurbished Boys Boarding residence to be known as Champagnat House. Champagnat House is named in honour of St Marcellin Champagnat the founder of the Marist Brothers. Champagnat House naming honours the enduring legacy, character and story of St Marcellin Champagnat and his vision to make Jesus Christ known and loved. It also reflects the ideal culture that we aspire to have for our boys' boarding, where young men are guided to be men of strength and courage; and also at the same time, men of gentleness in nature and spirit.

A special thanks to Bishop Columba MacBeth Green who officially blessed and opened Champagnat House. I am most grateful for the special guests from Marist Schools Australia, Catholic Schools NSW, local Mayors and Principals from regional schools who were able to be with us on the day.

The Boys Boarding redevelopment and expansion project cost \$7,174,000 to build, with construction for the project taking 2 years to complete. We are most grateful to the State Government for a grant of \$3,030,296 that allowed us to go ahead with this project.

Without this grant, we would have been unable to complete this project.

The newly renovated and extended Boys' Boarding project has allowed for:

- Additional bedroom spaces with individual rooms for each student.
- An increase in breakout and social gathering areas for study, reading, tv, playing games or just having a chat
- A higher ratio of shower and toilet facilities
- A large kitchen and recreational area
- Accessible access throughout the building
- An expansion of staff facilities with 6 ensuite rooms and a large lounge and kitchen area
- Two accessible ensuite rooms for students
- A central parent reception with access to both junior and senior residences
- Energy-efficient fixtures throughout the building.

We are so blessed to have exceptional boarding facilities for our students. Boarding at Red Bend is so much more than just having a nice place to stay. It is about being part of a supportive and caring community where students can form lasting friendships and develop values and life skills in forming them to be; in the words of St Marcellin Champagnat, Good Christians and Good Citizens.

Over the years, thousands of students have passed through the doors of Marist Brothers College and Red Bend Catholic College, and these students have gone on to achieve great success in their chosen fields. Many have become community leaders and have made valuable contributions to society. This is testament to the quality of boarding provided over many years and to the enduring legacy of Red Bend Catholic College. Boarding is core to what Red Bend Catholic College is all about; a Marist community inspiring the Minds, Hearts and Spirits of those in our care.



What is the National Schools Constitutional Convention (NSCC)?

How were you selected to attend?

In typical fashion, the teachers promptly reminded the students of how grateful they needed to be. The students learned about the legislative process between the two houses of Parliament and particularly enjoyed waving at the MPs and Senators as they discussed matters of national significance.

After a timely departure and a quick stop at Yass for some snacks of questionable nutritional value, we made an early and uneventful return to Forbes. 

FACT SHEET FOR PARENTS, GUARDIANS AND CARERS

WHAT IS THE NCCD?

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) takes place every year.

The NCCD is a collection that counts:

- the number of school students receiving an adjustment or 'help' due to disability
- the level of adjustment they are receiving to access education on the same basis as other students.

Students are counted in the NCCD if they receive ongoing adjustments at school due to disability. This 'help' allows them to access education on the same basis as a child without disability. The NCCD uses the definition of disability in the Disability Discrimination Act 1992.

Schools provide this information to education authorities.

Go to What is a reasonable adjustment? below to learn about adjustments.

WHY IS THIS DATA BEING **COLLECTED?**

All schools in Australia must collect information about students with disability.

The NCCD:

- ensures that the information collected is transparent, consistent and reliable
- provides better information that improves understanding of students with disability
- allows parents, guardians, carers, teachers, principals, education authorities and government to better support students with disability.

Student with disability loading

Funding from the Australian Government for students with disability is based on the NCCD through the student with disability loading.

Students with disability who are counted in the top three levels of the NCCD (extensive, substantial and supplementary) attract the loading. Funding is based on a per-student amount at each of the three levels of additional support. The amount of the loading reflects the level of support students with disability need to participate fully in school, with higher funding for those who need higher levels of support.

Australian Government recurrent school funding is provided as a lump sum to school authorities including state and territory governments, which can then distribute the funding to their member schools according to their own needs-based arrangements.

The Government expects schools and school systems to consider their funding from all sources (ie Australian Government, state and territory and private) and prioritise their spending to meet the educational needs of all of their students, including students with disability.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF THE NCCD FOR STUDENTS?

The information collected by the NCCD helps teachers, principals, education authorities and governments to better support students with disability at school.

The NCCD encourages schools to review their learning and support systems and processes. This helps schools to continually improve education outcomes for all students.
